Why do we need this Ordinance

Over the past three years the Topeka Fire Department has responded, on average, to 904 false alarms per year; with a high of over 1,200 in 2015

Part of the Accreditation Process is a self assessment, which includes how our resources are deployed

Why do we need this Ordinance

2017 Nuisance Alarm Systems (over 11 false alarms) 12 Addresses responsible 212 false alarms 1 Address responsible for 43 false alarms

2016 Nuisance Alarm Systems (over 11 false alarms)
 9 Addresses responsible for 140 false alarms
 1 Address responsible for 46 false alarms

2015 Nuisance Alarm Systems (over 11 false alarms)
 8 Addresses responsible for 143 false alarms
 1 Address responsible for 23 false alarms



Why Do We Need This Ordinance

- Resources valued between \$300,000.00 \$750,000.00 have been utilized in the past 3 years responding to these false alarms
- In 2017 approximately 3935 personnel hours were used responding to false alarms
 - This type of Ordinance is common in communities around Kansas including Wichita, Salina, Manhattan, Emporia, Overland Park and Leawood

Why do we need this Ordinance

- Responding to these false alarms removes companies from their 1st alarm response territories
- False alarm responses increase wear on equipment and firefighters
- Responding to false alarms creates an unjustified risk to the community and emergency responders



What are we trying to accomplish Reduce the number of false alarms How will this be accomplished

- Education will be a key component in reducing false alarms
- Monitored commercial fire alarms will require permitting with the City of Topeka Fire Department
- · Permits will be renewed annually
- Permitting will require a copy of current testing and maintenance records

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Enforcement

- There is grace period for newly installed systems
- Systems with more than 3 false alarms per year will result in a violation
- Violations will be assessed via a tiered system
- Nuisance alarm systems (over 11 false alarms) will be required to have maintenance and inspection by a licensed fire alarm contractor.

Permit fees

- There will be a \$25.00 permit les
- Applications will be required to be renewed annually
- \$25.00 renewal ise will be waived if violation occurred during the previous year



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Violation fee matrix

Per Calendar Year

0-3	No Charge
4-10	\$25.00 per occurrence
11-20	\$50.00 per occurrence
21-30	\$75.00 per occurrence
31-50	\$100.00 per occurrence
51 or more	\$250.00 per occurrence

Violations may be appealed in accordance with TMC 2.145.020.

Summary

- We have a problem with commercial false alarms in our city
- False alarms are a drain on the City of Topeka's emergency response resources
- Requiring an Operational Permit will ensure that required testing and maintenance is being performed on alarm systems
- Passage of this Ordinance will enable us to address the issue through education and enforcement
- The end goal is to provide a safer community and reducing false alarms will assist in accomplishing that goal
