







60 community members were engaged in helping to shape these ideas for maximum impact



# RECOMMENDED FOR NEXT STEP ACTION IN 2024 - 2025

- 1. One Stop Homeless Resource Center\*\*
- 2. Investment in a Continuum of Housing Solution\*\* specifically a low-barrier shelter and permanent tiny home villages
- Multi-Sector Community Coalition Development of a multi-sector community coalition, designed to support systemic and collaborative action towards solutions designed to reduce/end homelessness
- 4. Transportation Service to help people experiencing homelessness to access support services and employment, when available public transit is gapped
- Doubling Down on Programs and Services that are Working in the Community conducting an audit, guided by a rubric of various programs in the city and investing in grant writers to support channeling more money to those programs
- Housing and Employment Second Chance Offering designed to reconcile housing and employment problems that might lead to a person becoming homeless
- 7. Creation of a Centralized Data Hub aggregate data from across agencies is collected and analyzed to support data-driven decisions community-wide on where and how funding for services should be invested in the community

# RECOMMENDED FOR ACTION 2026 AND BEYOND

- Workplace Connections designed to create job matches between people experiencing homelessness and the employers in the Topeka region needing skilled labor
- 9. Landlord Incentives for Second Chances creating intentional partnerships with landlords, where they are willing to "take a chance" on someone who might have poor credit or other red flags in their background, in return for attractive incentives




